4th Sunday in Lent


The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

[Jesus said:] ¹⁴"Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

¹⁶"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."



In 2011 I enrolled at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary (LTSS) in Columbia, SC. As the landscape of theological education was changing in those days due to the decline of mainline Protestantism, many seminaries around the country were adjusting to lower enrollment by merging. LTSS become involved in another option. In 2013, the thriving Lenoir-Rhyne University (LRU) sought to buy the seminary and use its campus in Columbia to continue theological education for seminarians and expand other undergraduate opportunities. It wasn't long before the multi-year pandemic hit, which furthered the thrust for online instead of on campus learning. Over time, the cost for retaining the Columbia campus became prohibitive.

Below is a letter from SC Bishop Aebischer that provides more details regarding the decision to relocate LTSS and the LRU undergraduate programs from Columbia, SC to the campus of LRU, in Hickory, NC. Continue to hold the faculty, students, governing bodies, and support staff in your prayers through this change. When significant change comes to the church, I like to ponder the words of Jesus, "behold, I am making all things new." I like to remember that the church is about death and resurrection. Rebirth, regeneration, and resurrection are important words to the church. And with a new beginning, there will be blessings and opportunities that would not have happened without relocation. I look forward to seeing new things from LTSS and LRU as a new phase begins, and God's grace continues to change lives.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Last week Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary announced that it is planning to move from Columbia, South Carolina, to the main campus of Lenoir-Rhyne University in Hickory, North Carolina in January. The final approval of this move will come from the university's trustees later this month.

This is hard news for those of us who were formed on the campus in Columbia and for all those who have precious memories of those holy spaces and places. Even in the midst of sadness, however, I am giving thanks that our beloved seminary, which has a long history of pilgrimage, will go on to have a new chapter in Hickory.

I learned this news when Lenoir-Rhyne and LTSS leaders met with me to share their plan and ask for advice, and their reasons for the move are clear. By embedding the seminary on the campus in Hickory, Lenoir-Rhyne will save about \$2.1 million per year in operating costs and eliminate significant deferred maintenance costs on the Columbia campus. That campus is far larger than the seminary's current program requires, especially since, like other mainline seminaries, LTSS now enrolls many hybrid and commuter students. Online education opens to each of us all kinds of opportunities to continue our education from the comforts of our home office, but that reality has significant impact and brings real changes in the ways institutions like Southern Seminary can function when 75% or more of the student body is online...

Lenoir-Rhyne University leaders have assured me that this is not downsizing or a change in the seminary's curriculum or strategic plan. In fact, by saving in operating costs, the seminary hopes to be able to expand its program in the years to come...




